Did You Know

RainCity Housing is leading the way with its 'Housing First' philosophy. Many of the current supported housing programs in Vancouver require that individuals achieve a substantial level of "housing readiness" before they can access housing. Typically this means a client must be stable, linked with treatment services, able to self-administer medications and have minimal levels of challenging behaviours.

By providing services to those who may not be considered 'housing ready' by others, RainCity Housing has been successful in breaking the cycles of chronic homelessness, instability and substance use for many of their clients by providing assertive interventions within a high tolerance environment.

The goal is not simply to get people off the streets. It's to provide a comprehensive array of supports to assist in achieving stability, thereby allowing people to move forward with their lives.

Making a Difference A Cup of Care

It started with an idea to prepare and distribute enough soup to feed hundreds of people through the winter of 2008, one of the coldest in Vancouver's History.



The folks at Joey Restaurant Group first approached RainCity Housing in the fall of 2008. They had an idea that could to make a difference for people staying in shelters in Vancouver's Downtown Eastside. They would prepare and distribute enough soup to feed hundreds of people through one of the coldest winters in Vancouver's History. A Cup of Care was launched.

Now in its second year, Joey Restaurant's Cup of Care program prepared and served 10,000 cups of soup to those in need in communities across Canada. "We wanted to find a way to harness the

skills and talents of our team to help our community," says Chris Mills, Executive Chef, Joey Restaurants. "Providing good food is what we do best, so preparing nutritious meals for our neighbours in need seemed like the perfect way to help. As a company it is really important to us to give back to the community and make a difference and we plan to continue the Cup of Care program, and we hope to see it grow in the future."

When asked what first drew her to RainCity Housing and what she liked about the organization, Jennifer responded:

"I'm now an organizational psychologist but at the outset of my career, I worked with Youth At Risk For Street Involvement. Due to their exposure to substance abuse, violence or neglect, some of the teens had one foot in and one foot out of street life– they literally teetered on the edge. As a result, this sometimes put me on the streets alongside the kids.

I saw what it was like when you have no where to go, when no one seems to care if you live or die, or when everywhere you turn, someone wants to use you. When I was introduced to RainCity Housing, it brought me back to these roots and I saw how RCH pierces this darkness and I wanted to help in some way, again. I like the tenants/clients. I like their courage, their sense of community and the lessons they teach about human spirit and dignity. I like the staff for all

these same reasons and I appreciate the donors and funders for their compassion and sense of community too. And finally, I believe in the aspiration and the inherent dignity behind the RainCity mission—a home for every person. "
